# From The Managing Director.



*Unfortunately it was not possible to have an issue of "Depth" completed prior to Christmas so that we could talk a little about our successes of 1977 and whilst the various layers of management are certainly aware that we really did have a good overall performance for the year, there were some outstanding successes such as a particularly fine performance by the Computer Systems group and there were a number of individual good performances in other disciplines, some of which are referred to in this issue.*

*Orders overall grew by 19% whereas staff growth was less than 3% which is indicative of improved productivity throughout most areas.*

*Some additional systems were implemented such as FICS and SIS and as with most new systems they brought along their fair share of headaches but it's good to note that through a team effort many of the problems have been resolved and hopefully these systems will prove of additional benefit to us during FY78 and future years.*

*Since our last issue, of course, all details relating to quotas and targets have been completed and if the pointers relating to business are a true indication, it could be that FY78 could be a \$30,000,000 operation in our area for the first time.*

*Obviously this growth will need some fairly careful planning and I am quite sure that during the year you will find that a number of organizational changes will, of necessity, take place. It is imperative that as any change is effected we all do our best to ensure as completely smooth a change in operational mode as humanly possible.*

*Undoubtedly there will be many new challenges come to light throughout the year and one would hope that the opportunities created may be satisfied by current HP people, it's therefore imperative that as each of you discuss your evaluation with your supervisors you make it clear what your ambitions for the future may be. Without management's full knowledge of your future career it is sometimes difficult to ensure that everyone has been considered for a particular position.*

## WAYNE SQUIRES TALKS ON 10 YEARS OF HP IN NEW ZEALAND

In the 10 years of presence in New Zealand, HP has come full circle. Starting in Wellington on September 1, 1967, Hewlett-Packard (N.Z.) Ltd. was the Eastern District of HP Australia. Now, in 1977, New Zealand is again the Eastern District, achieving greater efficiency by using common resources.

Don Watson opened the first office in Kent Terrace, Wellington with a secretary and a lot of work in front of him. It was in this location that they weathered the storm that sank the "Wahine", when the windows had to be roped closed to prevent them breaking in the wind.

Ian Richards, now Quality Assurance Engineer in Australia joined the company as Service Engineer in November, 1968 and had the longest HP service record of any employee commencing work in New Zealand.

Wayne Squires was the next employee. He started operations from home in Auckland in 1970 with his wife Maureen answering the telephone and secretarial work was done by a public stenographer.

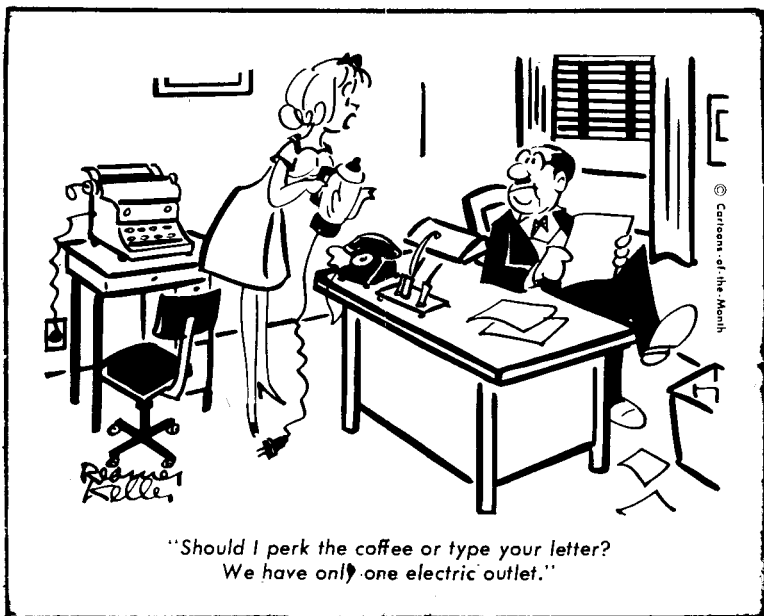
A few months later Ian Parker began selling calculators and Distance Measuring Instruments from Wellington.

At the end of 1970, New Zealand went half way round the circle with Derek Barlow coming from Australia as Country Manager and the organization obtaining country status in the HP organization.

Increased business and staff numbers required larger premises and Dixon Street office was occupied in January, 1971 with, we thought, enough space to keep us going for a long time.

Growth in people numbers and orders proved us wrong, and the present office in Kilburnie was started in 1974, and occupied in June, 1975.

The Auckland office was opened in 1973 with bare walls and floors, no furniture or typewriter and one power point which often led to the situation illustrated.



## 10 YEARS OF HP IN NEW ZEALAND (Cont'd)

Since then we now occupy three of the ten suites in the building along with dentists, chiropractors and architects. Three years will see us on the move from here.

HP New Zealand made its presence known in 1975 with the large data systems order for the Social Welfare and Inland Revenue Departments. Despite our involvement, we still pay a lot of tax and wait for weeks to obtain our tax rebates. However, this did provide an opportunity to build a very efficient service organization headed by Dave Knight.

As a result of the order, Christchurch service office was opened. Des Spillane now services some of the HP computers closest to the South Pole and is able to drop into a Southern Alp ski field on the way home. However, the guys in Auckland have the best opportunities for leisure living, they enjoy a natural spa bath before bed whilst working in Rotorua and ski at Mt. Ruapehu on Saturday before travelling home.

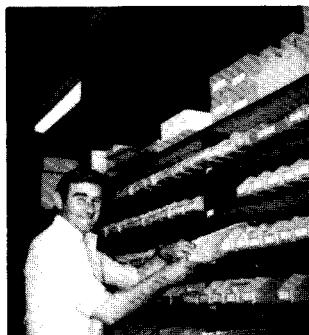
In November 1976, Derek Barlow resigned to set up his own business in Wanganui, a small city 200 miles north of Wellington. This presented the opportunity to implement changes designed to increase the efficiency of HP operations in the South Pacific. New Zealand had come full circle and was again a district of an expanded Australasian operation and was now able to draw on the management and physical resources of Australia to support the growth.

Where does HP New Zealand go from here? It will always be an efficient part of the Australasian area and will continue to grow, but like other New Zealand companies, will be strongly influenced by the fluctuations in the country's economy. The oil price increases hit New Zealand very hard but we at last have a government which is bargaining solidly for fair prices for our primary produce and resources on the world's market. HP (N.Z.) is assisting in this by providing equipment, service and technical support to assist our country to retain its place.

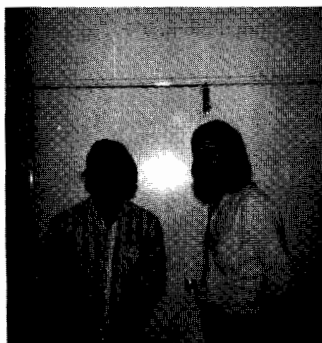

YVONNE WARNER has transferred from Service to become a Secretary in the Instruments Produces Sales Group.

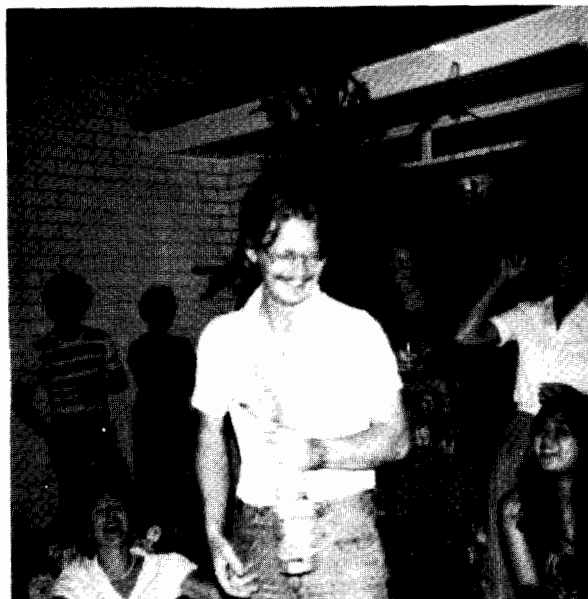

A series of "Family Concerts" are held each season in various capital cities. Aimed at parents and children, they are mixed, lighter programs of music, scheduled for early evening.

## MONITORING AND CONTROL SEMINARS

During September, the Instrument Group in conjunction with the Computing Products Group, held a series of Seminars for technical management.

## SALES BASICS

We ran a Train-the-Trainer session for the new HP Sales Basics Course in December. Three Product Sales Managers and eight District Managers attended plus Jim Creed, Marcom Manager. The Course Leaders were George Cobbe, Intercontinental Marketing Manager and John Hayes, Icon Regional Marketing Manager/Medical.

The Trainers agreed at the end of the program that it has a great deal to offer all existing and new field sales staff.

If anything, the program is inappropriately named. Rather than teaching Sales Basics it really examines the fundamental sales processes and ways in which sales people can develop and improve their skills.

Throughout the balance of FY78, courses will be run in Sydney and Melbourne and all Field Engineers, Sales Representatives and Staff Engineers will attend one of these sessions. We anticipate that it will be necessary to run five programs this year and so organise the attendees' lists, that there is a fair representation of experienced and inexperienced field sales staff, multi-discipline and wherever possible inter-office groups. New Zealand field sales staff will also participate.

The programme schedule will be available at the end of January. The first course will be in Melbourne the week beginning January 23 with a total of twelve participants.

## SERVICE DEPARTMENT LUNCHEON

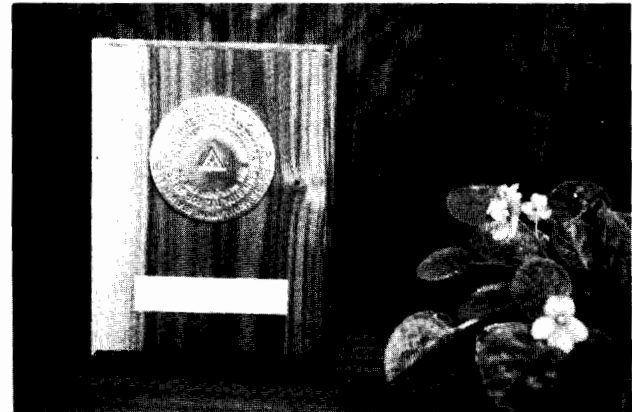
The Service Department held its annual lunch at the HP Melbourne new barbecue area.

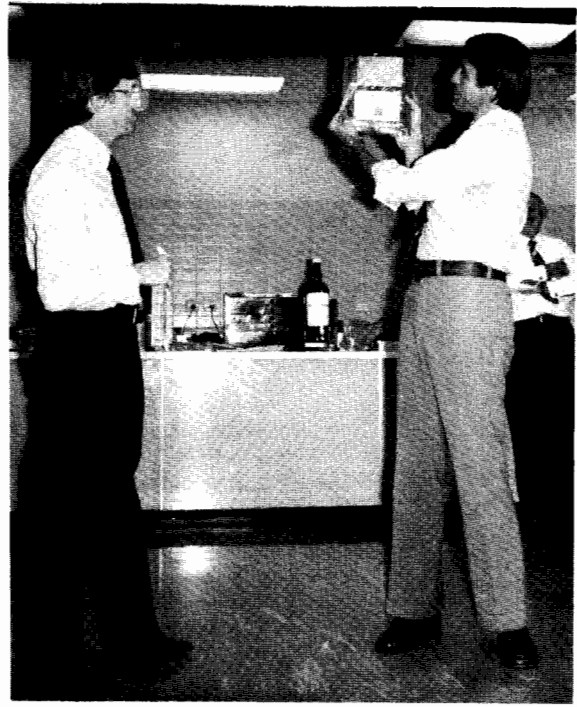


Alan holding the plaque which he presented to John Warmington in recognition of our 10th Anniversary. It shows the Order Volume Achievement for Australia and New Zealand.

Many thanks to the generous HP staff who donated toys to the appeal for the Reach Out For Kids Foundation (ROK), which was instigated by the Melbourne Calculator Group.

More About ROK . . .

There are many children in our community in need of help, of understanding, of companionship; children whose lives could be made more meaningful and satisfying if that help were available.

Reach Out For Kids is an organization that tries to provide that help. ROK is run by voluntary helpers under the leadership of a full time administrator.

ROK provides counselling services, camps, excursions, family fun days, bike hikes and many other activities for kids who may be emotionally, socially or economically deprived.

One of ROK's major activities is the running of camps for kids. At least twenty days of camping is provided each year for each child, some of whom have never been camping before. The camps are well-run by a large team of voluntary youth leaders. At each camp there is a ratio of one leader to two children. The leaders, who are trained by ROK, undertake follow-up work with the children between camps.

ROK started in 1972 by running camps for kids and has now developed into a worthwhile, viable community organization. The kids in ROK are referred by social workers, Council youth workers, the police, probation officers, the Education Department, ministers of religion and children's homes.
