NEW BUILDING FOR SYDNEY.

-hp- has just purchased a 5 acre block of land in Talavera Road, North Ryde from Amalgamated Wireless (Australasia) Limited with the intention of building a sales and service facility to replace the current leased premises at Pymble. Phil Towle, a former manager of the Corporate Construction Group in Palo Alto, who was actively involved in the design of the Blackburn facility, is coming out of retirement to work with the local Company management in the selection of architects and contractors and the supervision of design and construction. Roger Bailey and Phil Towle will be working with Sydney staff during early February on preliminary design specifications and we hope to commence construction later this year.
